Mentorship is about connection. It's about consistency and building healthy relationships that last. Mentorship is about helping each other learn and grow and find magic within ourselves to unlock our full potential. If you are a mentor, the rewards for you are endless. And for your mentee, the benefits are measurable.

Now, we have the scientific research to explain both why mentorship works, and how significantly it truly does change lives.

#### Mentorship = Resilience

When you mentor a young person, you're providing a stable, healthy, committed relationship with an adult. According to the research, this type of relationship can protect a child from the effects of toxic stress experienced when living with childhood adversities. Building resilience.

Neuroscience tells us that these nurturing, caring relationships help buffer the impact of adversities on a child's developing brain. It also tells us that resilient children and youth grow to be happier, healthier adults. So when you become a mentor, what you're really doing is helping a child access their resilience, directly improving their life. According to the Center on the Developing Child at Harvard University, you're also helping prevent negative health complications in adulthood such depression, anxiety, violent behaviors and substance problems.

Measurably, increased resilience means improved outcomes in each of the following categories: 1) Social Emotional Competence, 2) Mental Health & Wellbeing, and 3) Educational Engagement & Employment Readiness. When you become a mentor, you're helping with each of these.




The above figures represent the audited revenues and expenditures of Big Brothers Big Sisters of Waterloo Region for the fiscal year ended December 31, 2022. The year saw a healthy increase in both agency's fundraising and operations through the fiscal year. While certain market impacts (government funding, labour markets, financial markets) did negatively affect the bottom line, they are expected to be temporary. Support for the children and youth in our programs have recovered since the pandemic and the financial stability and results of the agency continues with strong support of donors and funding partners.

## THE IMPACT OF DEVELOPMENTAL RELATIONSHIPS

#### **Challenge Growth**

**85%** of youth feel that their mentor encourages them to be their best

#### **Expand Possibilities**

**78%** of youth feel their mentor has connected them with new people, places, or ideas

#### **Express Care**

**90%** of youth feel their mentor shows them that they matter to them

#### **Provide Support**

**78%** of youth feel their mentor helps them get things done

#### **Share Power**

**90%** of youh feel their mentor listens to their ideas and takes them seriously

**100%** of mentors noted that they put conscious effort toward expressing care and providing support to their mentees.

## THE NEED IN WATERLOO REGION

Young people in our programs are facing daily adversities and barriers to their success. Mentorship can enable young people to thrive, despite the challenges they face.

- 73% have experienced social isolation
- 70% have been exposed to financial stress
- 90% have experienced parental separation or divorce
- 72% have experienced bullying
- 74% have been exposed to mental illness within their household
- 49% are coping with mental illness

## LETTER FROM A BIG SISTER

My name is Ana and I started volunteering with BBBSWR in my first year of nursing school back in 2016. I did the in school mentoring program and got matched with a girl in grade 4 - she was only 8 years old at the time.

She is now almost 16 years old, and in a couple of months I will be taking her to get her G1 license and teaching her how to drive! She has grown into the most beautiful, smart and caring person I know. She is doing so well in school and is going into grade 11 in September with plans to become a nurse.

BBBSWR gave us both a sister we never knew we had and for that we cannot thank you enough. We have been through so many difficult times together and are so thankful to have had each other throughout them.
